



Sensory Integration

What is Sensory Integration Therapy?

Sensory integration therapy is a specialty area of practice that involves the use of special equipment and sensory rich activities to help a child improve his/her ability to take in, make sense of, and respond appropriately to input. The child learns to register, integrate, modulate, and use sensory information through sensory integration therapy.





What does Sensory Integration Therapy address?

Children with sensory integration disorders have difficulty receiving stimuli through one or more of the senses. Children typically receive stimuli through their senses of touch, taste, sound, sight, and smell. They also receive stimuli through lesser known senses: vestibular (sense through the inner ear), and proprioceptive (sense through the joints, ligaments, and muscles).

Children with a sensory processing disorder have difficulty using the sensory information in meaningful ways. Sensory Integration Therapy allows the child to engage in age appropriate treatment activities while the therapist controls the sensory influences upon the vestibular system, muscles, joints, and skin.
